Janet Randell, BA (Hons) AISTD, Choreographer, Director of The Cedar Dance Theatre Company and Dance Animator/ Artistic Director of Cedar Dance Animations. Janet's diverse contributions to the dance world have been innovative and ground breaking. Her roles also include: independent choreographer and dance animator, lecturer, teacher, author and researcher. As founder/artistic director of The Cedar Dance Theatre Company, which has performed in the Barbican Theatre and other venues in London and throughout the UK, Janet has continued to push the boundaries of creativity in her dance productions. Janet Randell has also freelanced for many years as a choreographer for stage and TV, and has choreographed, directed and taught in the UK, New York, China, Australia, Holland and the Republic of Ireland.

In her choreography Janet Randell produces an eclectic range of artistic imagery, drawn from her expertise in ballet, modern dance, and from her postgraduate research in dance history, religious dance and ritual, as well as literature, art and music. Over the years she has created dance works of beauty, quality, and musicality, conveying a rare depth of choreographic expression, to great critical acclaim.

Most recently Janet Randell has been working with animation and film, exploring new aspects of her choreography through digital and animated dance using LifeForms, DanceForms and other cutting edge 3D animation and motion technology.

Through the production of her independent dance animations with Cedar Dance Animations, she has found a new way of integrating dance as a performance art with her own choreographic styles, expressed through this new and exciting genre.

The Tutorial Guide to DanceForms is a culmination of Janet Randell's exploration of dance, choreography and animation, providing an interactive platform for choreographers, teachers and students alike.

Janet Randell has choreographed most of the dance animations and stills for The Tutorial Guide to DanceForms, which contains hundreds of animated dance illustrations and movies. These include Dancing Forms for Eight, an experimental study for eight dancers, set to the music of Pachlebel's Canon in D. The dance has also been reconstructed and performed with choreographic variations by live dancers at the Robin Howard Theatre, London, as part of an experimental collaboration between digital and live dance.

A filmed performance by The Cedar Dance Theatre Company is also featured in the Guide.

Further Information on Stage/TV Work

In her many years as an international dance teacher and guest choreographer, Janet Randell has worked with various dance companies and institutions, including Ailey III, one of the Ailey Dance Companies formed by Alvin Ailey in New York, directed by Kelvin Rotardier, former dancer of The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater (AAADT); the Irish National Ballet; the Academy of the Central Ballet of China in Beijing; the Guangzhou Dance Company, China; the Hong Kong Academy of the Performing Arts and the Royal Academy of Dancing UK. Examples of her modern ballets include Stonerites, The Line That Goes For A VValk based on the paintings and writings of the artist Paul Klee and Ancient Voices, inspired by the Sumerian and Biblical story of Job.

In addition, Janet Randell has choreographed a number of ballets for TV, including the Jesus Then and Now series and various modern productions with dancers from the Royal Ballet and Rambert Dance Company, formerly Ballet Rambert. She has collaborated with a number of musicians and has also choreographed numerous works for The Cedar Dance Theatre Company. Her dance works have been performed throughout the UK and on TV, including Foxes in the Vineyard, Misa Criolla, Chorale and Labyrinth, a dramatic dance based on an early mediaeval liturgical Easter dance.



Dance Animator

In 1999, Janet Randell began to explore her choreography through digital and animated dance, using DanceForms (formally called LifeForms) and other animation and motion technology. She is now producing independent dance animations, which integrate dance as a performance art with her own choreographic styles.

Janet Randell's experiments with animation are providing a new and innovative platform for her artistic expression. She is considered to be one of the leading creative independent dance animators worldwide.

Janet writes:

I have discovered that I can create a whole new art form using the fusion of digital technology with the language and vocabulary of dance. I am able to use these to transcend the range of stage performance.

Not only can this new form of expression convey the emotional, uplifting and spiritual side of dance, but it can also celebrate the innovative possibilities of probing and extending the boundaries of dance, elevating the finite into the infinite.



As a creative dance animator, Janet Randell has been attracted to DanceForms for many years. It enables her to explore the limitless possibilities available in digital dance and to experiment with using virtual bodies as well as live dancers for the process of choreography.

Janet writes:

There is something magical about creating and viewing a piece of work in miniature. Some of the best works by the painter Paul Klee and the later paper cut-out figures created by Henri Matisse were created in about twelve inches square, no bigger than the desktop of an everyday laptop.

The dance figures in DanceForms are almost puppet-like and seem to attract both dancers and non-dancers. Shape, space, time and rhythm can all be explored in infinite choreographic ways. Work created in this software is crying out to be translated back into live dance in a new and imaginative way.

I love the daring element of choreographing in DanceForms, of being able to push the body to unexpected limits and of challenging live dancers in the studio to endless choreographic possibilities.

DanceForms and Live Dance

Janet Randell, like Merce Cunningham, uses DanceForms to choreograph, as the software programme can be used as the visual equivalent of a musical score and sketches on a drawing board. Her work with groups of dancers has shown that the digital technology helps to liberate artistic experience and can enhance the interpretation of choreography.

Janet has directed various innovative projects involving the use of DanceForms with live performance for The Cedar Dance Theatre Company and for some of the young dancers from The Place, Central London, the UK's premier centre for contemporary dance, home of Richard Alston Dance Company and the London Contemporary Dance School.

In various digital dance projects at The Place, the dancers were provided with a computer in the dance studio and studied and performed Dancing Forms for Eight, a complete digital dance choreographed and animated by Janet Randell in DanceForms, to the music of Pachelbel's Canon. In another project the dancers recreated their own fourteen variations from Janet's digital choreographic setting of the dance to percussion. The projects, filmed at the Robin Howard Dance Theatre, The Place, London, and Theatre Severn, Shrewsbury, are featured in Tutorial 5 of The Tutorial Guide to DanceForms.

Janet writes:

I wanted the dancers to use the computer as a digital choreographic notepad. My aim was to see how DanceForms could translate as a teaching tool and how easy it would be for dancers to learn the dance sequences in a dance studio using the computer, then work on their own movement variations. I was sure that DanceForms would be a success as a springboard for both teaching and choreographic creativity.



Janet has developed her own inspired method of dancing, teaching and choreography.

She is the founder, director and choreographer of The Cedar Dance Theatre Company, an independent choreographer and digital dance animator and artistic director of Cedar Dance Animations.

Janet Randell devotes much of her time to exploring her dance repertoire through digital and animated dance and is experimenting with independent dance material from this new and exciting medium for both The Cedar Dance Theatre Company and Cedar Dance Animations.

Janet Randell has given lectures, presentations and seminars at educational institutions in the UK on how to use *DanceForms* as part of her choreographic work in dance animation. She has directed various collaborative projects with the Young Dancers at *The Place*, London, and with *The Cedar Dance Theatre Company*, using digital and live dance, as featured in her DVD series, *The Tutorial Guide to DanceForms*.

Movement Therapy and Environmental Dance

As Chairman of VVoods, Hills & Tracks, a charity that focuses on opening up new challenges to people with all types of disabilities, Janet Randell has also explored dance and movement with various physically and mentally disabled groups. Indoor movement and dance animation seminars with DanceForms as an option are offered for small groups, as well as outdoor environmental dance projects for movement therapy.

One of her ventures has involved the creation of multimedia dance projects for the disabled, incorporating the interaction between movement, therapy and nature with environmental dance, video, film and dance animation.



Environmental Dance, Woods, Hills and Tracks

A vision to choreograph and direct the planting of her own arboretum round a 3/4 mile wheelchair access was prompted by Janet's visit to the site of an ancient felled woodland, deep in the heart of Wales. The transformation from bare field to wheelchair pathway and arboretum was created with the Local Spinal Injuries Unit in mind. She planted trees native to the area interspersed with specimen trees and shrubs, which provide all year round colour, fragrance and variety. Encouraged to touch, feel and smell the flora, wheelchair bound visitors, as well as those with visual impairments and other disabilities, can enjoy the contrasting textures and scents from the wheelchair access.

Some of her environmental and dance projects take place in this naturally growing stage set.

Janet writes:

In the theatre, I took the idea of 'taking a line for a walk' by the artist Paul Klee and created a ballet for The Cedar Dance Theatre Company and the Irish National Ballet.

In the countryside I started with a bare field as an empty stage and then I took a path for wheelchairs with access for all for a walk and created a growing environment for dance, film and artistic activities. The textures, colours and scents of the growing trees and shrubs are my artistic backdrop, with lighting and scenery that changes at every moment of the day.






